

"I Liked Most Every Minute of Teaching"



Can you imagine facing kids day after day for year and liking most every minute of it? Mrs. Irwin did! In fact, when she was growing up, she never dreamed of anything else but being a teacher when she completed her own education. "Back in those days, though, there really weren't many other job opportunities for women."

Katie, as most of us call her now, was born in Ayrshire, Iowa, in Palo Alto County on January 25, 1892 and started to school in the one-room Lost Island Lake Country School. When she was ten years old, the family

moved to New Virginia, and her dad built the house in which Richard Strange lives. Her parents, obviously wanting to give her the best education possible, paid tuition and sent her to school in New Virginia rather than to the country school in their area. She graduated from New Virginia High School in 1910 but remained at home for another year.

A high school diploma was all that was required, in those early years, before one went into teaching. The country schools had three terms: Fall, Winter and Spring. In the Spring of 1911, a teacher was needed to fill out this term at Big Rock Country School, and Miss Gleckler began her teaching career. Big Rock, as such, doesn't exist anymore, but this school was located northeast of New Virginia on the west side of the road across from Ed McDole's house.

In the Fall of 1911, Miss Gleckler taught in the Happy Hollow Country School and completed all three terms there. Happy Hollow has also gone by the wayside. This school was down the hill just southwest of George Smalley's house near the former railroad tracks. "Of course, in those days, you were your own janitor, and I had 36 children in that one-room school to prepare lessons for, including all the elementary grades through the eighth. Some of my students were nearly as old as I was. My most memorable experience there was the morning I went in to get the fire started and the necessary preparations made before the children arrived, and I discovered a tramp had evidently spent the night there. Thank goodness he was gone before I arrived! That was a hilarious year!" The next year, she came in to New Virginia and taught one year, then was married to Benjamin Harrison Irwin on June 4, 1913. She and Ben made their home on the farm where Dick Hoversten lives. Much too soon, however, Katie had to return to teaching, as her husband passed away in 1918, and she was left with two small children to support. Happy Hollow School had closed by this time, so she bought the building, had it moved into town and made into the house

that has been her home ever since. In the Fall of 1919, she began teaching in the New Virginia School again and continued through the year of 1959, when she retired. During these years it also became necessary to have college credits to keep the teaching certificate, so she completed those requirements by attending both Simpson College and Drake University while helping her two children to complete their college education. Over the years, she taught children of at least three generations of several families.

Since her retirement, her hobbies have been quilting, making afghans, crocheting and making craft items such as coat hangers, bead necklaces, etc. Her most loved ones, though, are her flowers, gardening and cooking. Even though her health does not permit her to be as active as she'd like, she still gardens and cans the harvested food items. She also had to slow down on participation in organizations, but she is a member of the United Methodist Church, over a 50-year member of Neophyte Chapter Number 206, Order of the Eastern Star, a member of Past Matrons Club and belongs to the New Virginia Garden Club.

Nearly every winter since her retirement, Katie has spent a few months with her children in Illinois and Indiana, and at this writing, she is making preparations to leave for this season. She's always glad to go for a visit, but by spring, she's quite anxious to get back to her own home and out into her garden and flower bed.

Many reading this article will no doubt be a past student of Mrs. Irwin. To you, especially, she said, "I liked most every minute of teaching school, and I'm always interested in hearing from or about any student I've ever taught. I hear from several at Christmas time, and others stop in when they come to town. I really do appreciate hearing from and visiting all of them."

Katie Irwin passed away at the home of her daughter Martha and husband Earl Finder in Urbana, Illinois on July 12, 1978 at the age of 86. At that time, her son James and wife Martha Irwin lived in Indianapolis, Indiana. Katie had five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren at the time of her death.

Any number of former students have been heard to make remarks of how well they liked Mrs. Irwin and what part she had in helping them overcome their trials in education or achieve their goal in life. There's no doubt that she holds a pleasant spot in the hearts and minds of most who've ever known her. Thanks to Jody Taylor and Vicki Morris who suggested this retelling of Katie Irwin's story and identified Katie's house as being at 128 Main Street and subsequently owned by Roger Carlson, Amy Morris Janssen and Merlin Morris.

A Glimpse in Kindergarten

When I began my teaching career in 1990, I never could have imagined the course education would take. It has definitely changed over the last 31 years.

My perspective comes exclusively from kindergarten. Not only have I taught only this grade level, but I also have had many different experiences that range from half-day, full-day, and team teaching. I have also taught in three districts and two states: Iowa and Missouri.

Let's take a look at how it has changed.

1990: full-day kindergarten

Preschool: Preschool was most often in churches, and the focus was social and fine motor skills, not academic. Most of my students never attended Preschool.

Kindergarten Report Card: My report card consisted of: full name, address, phone number, tying shoes, letters, sounds, number recognition, counting, shapes, colors, and social skills. The reports cards were several layers of paper that would transfer any printed information to the bottom sheets.

Our daily routine: We would do the calendar, read stories, practice handwriting in our writing books, and learning letters and sounds with the Letter People.

Math skills were taught through a writing curriculum using workbooks.

Each month, we had a science or social studies theme. Apples in September meant we would make applesauce on Johnny Appleseed Day. Art projects were done weekly as we worked through each theme.

Kindergarten stressed the importance of learning through play. This skill allowed students to learn about sharing, discovering through trial and error, following the rules of a game, assembling, constructing, and using our imagination.

We had snacks, napped, and had three recesses every day. The children also had special classes: library, art, physical education, and music.

Technology: Computers were non-existent for teachers and students. The only electrical device I would use was a TV. I would sign up to use the large TV on a cart to watch any educational videos. This was done by checking it out from the library.

2021: full-day kindergarten

Preschool: Students usually have a full year of Preschool prior to arriving in Kindergarten. Some have also attended three-year-old Preschool programs as well.

Kindergarten Report Cards:

Our report card is based on the Iowa Common Core. Academic standards are selected that reflect what a kindergartener should know prior to entering first grade. We still need to know our letters, sounds, numbers, and counting skills. But now we are reading words, decoding, and writing words. We are emergent readers and read 50+ sight words.

In math, we need to know the numbers, write the numbers, and count. But we also need to know greater and less than, counting on from a certain number, using games to learn mathematical skills, and solving addition and subtraction equations.

Grading is completed using my laptop on a platform called PowerSchool.

Daily Routine: This school year is focused around health and safety. First of all, we must all wear masks. Due to the pandemic, we are required to keep students and teachers safe at school. This has been a challenge for some of my students. I never dreamed I would be saying, "Cover your nose" multiple times a day to some of my students; but I am. We also wash our hands often, use hand sanitizer each time we enter the classroom, and practice social distancing as best we can.

We still do the calendar, but it has many more components. We find several ways to make a number, look at patterns, do addition, compare numbers, use a number line, make predictions, and document our observations.

We still learn letters and sounds, but we are also learning how to build and decode words. We have writing time on white boards and don't make just letters. We write words and sentences. The children have small group reading time and large group. We are emergent readers.

Math is not just learning numbers, but discussing our thinking, problem solving, and using manipulatives to show our thinking.

Science is not a theme a month. It is ongoing with weather, living and non-living things, and engineering. Art projects are usually tied to a current lesson or topic.

Play no longer is a focus. It is now part of Preschool. We have play time/center time at the beginning of the year. As new expectations are introduced, play time goes away. Play time/center time is usually inside recess.

We still have snacks, but we only have rest time the first half of the year. We have two recesses a day. We still have library, art, p.e., and music. We also have guidance class.

Technology: Students are savvy on an iPad, tablet, and some a chrome book. They are beginning to acquire typing skills. Our students can interact on a smart board. Many also know how to operate a smartphone.

Due to COVID, we can learn from home on a computer, if needed. In the past year, I have had remote students who get on a platform to get lessons. I insert recorded lessons, stories, videos, and printable activities for learning. Parents can help them remotely, and they respond back with videos, photos, and written responses for their work.

I have evolved as a teacher over the past 31 years. I am grateful for all the amazing educators with whom I have had the pleasure to work along the way. I have been blessed with not only great school districts, but also great students. Although the program has changed, the five- and six-year-olds who enter my classroom every year are still the same. They arrive each fall, full of wonder, curiosity, excitement, and love.

Iowa Fireworks Farm



One of the biggest challenges in the fireworks industry for 2021 has been getting products. The fireworks business was booming in 2020 across the U.S. This resulted in most of the wholesalers in the U.S. having empty warehouses after the 4th of July last summer, when they historically would have 20% to 40% of their warehouse still full at that time. At the same time last summer, U.S. consumer spending was peaking, as many consumers were buying things to entertain themselves or fix up their homes. since they hadn't been able to travel or do the things they normally would have done, due to COVID. This led to a surge in the demand for freight from China to the U.S., since so much of what the U.S. consumes is made in China, and fireworks are no exception. Unfortunately, almost all of the consumer fireworks used in the U.S. are made in China. As demand for more consumer goods increased through the fall and into the holidays, spots on cargo ships from China to the U.S. became harder and harder to get, as well as more expensive. The shipping cost of fireworks, which makes up a large part of the retail price, has roughly doubled from May 2020 to May 2021. As a result of the shipping issues and the unprecedented demand for fireworks last summer, there is expected to be an industry-wide shortage of 30% to 50% of the usual fireworks this summer. Fortunately for our store, once I saw how demand was ramping up last summer as soon as we opened our doors in June, I started ordering additional inventory and haven't stopped since. While there may be some things we would like to have on the shelves that we can't get this summer, we have well over twice as much inventory on hand as we did last summer, so we should be able to supply everyone with their boomers this summer, but if you want the best selection, it will be smart to shop early and not wait until the 1st of July.

Last summer, as a way of supporting the community that supports us, we partnered with a few organizations and selected a product for each of those organizations where we would donate \$10 from the sale of each firework to the respective organization. We were able to make donations at the end of the season to the New Virginia Old Settlers Committee, the I-35 Booster Club and the Truro Betterment Committee. We're looking forward to doing the same thing again this summer or possibly expanding the idea.

While many fireworks businesses try to have as many locations as possible to maximize sales, our approach is to create a pleasant and memorable shopping experience to everyone who comes through our doors. We do that by having a clean, organized store and knowledgeable staff who can assist those customers who want help in picking out their fireworks, all while providing the best value possible. I know that I always enjoy my fireworks more when I feel like I got a good deal on them. Our flagship "home" location will always be New Virginia, but if we can replicate that experience, I wouldn't rule out additional locations, but you don't get better by being bigger, you get bigger by being better.

Those Who Served



Those Who Served Junior D. Edwards

Junior D. Edwards from Indianola, Iowa, was born In October 1926. He served in the US Army and first joined in January 1945, at 19 years of age, just before World War II ended. He was discharged in August of 1946 but rejoined the Army in June of 1947. Junior attained the rank of Sergeant First Class and was sent to Korea. On January 2, 1951 Sfc Edwards was killed after distinguishing himself by conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action against the enemy. On January 16, 1952, his father received the Medal of Honor on his behalf at the Pentagon. Sfc Edwards is buried at the I.O.O.F. Cemetery in Indianola, Iowa.

The Medal of Honor has only been presented 3,526 times since 1861. It is the highest award anyone in the US military can receive. It always involves extreme war combat and extraordinary courage in the face of death. There are only 67 living recipients today. They don't win this medal; it isn't a contest. The Medal is awarded. The person is a "recipient" of the Medal of Honor. A general officer will salute a private if he is wearing the Medal of Honor.

I encourage you to look at Junior D. Edwards' citation on the Medal of Honor website and what others have done. They were fighting for us, but at the time they were fighting for their friends around them. It's been said that "freedom isn't free," and these 3,507 recipients have paid a great price.

City Of New Virginia

Council Meeting Minutes May 3rd, 2021

The Council met in regular session on Monday May 3rd, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. for the May Council Meeting.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Huston with Council Members Galivan, Nelson and Truman present. Absent Strange & Zuercher.

Minutes from the April meeting and Treasurer's Report were approved.

Old business discussed: It has been confirmed with Atlantic Bottling Company that a pop machine will be placed on the east side of the community building in GAMP Park. The Lions Club and Old Settlers Committee are ok with placing a pop machine in Old Settlers Park next to the shelter with proceeds from sales to be split between the two organizations. The placement of a pop machine in Lions Park has to be approved by Atlantic Bottling Company. Rick Long, Atlantic Bottling Company representative, will be contacted about placing a pop machine in Old Settlers Park.

The drainage problem in the 800 block of East Street was discussed. The price quote from Savage Excavating to alleviate the drainage problem is \$17250.00. It was decided to do a chlorine test on the water to make sure the source of the water is not coming from a water leak.

Nelson advised Terry Stuart will allow connection to a water curb stop on his property so a water line and hydrant can be run to the shelter building in Old Settlers Park if a hydrant is placed on his property at the time the work is being done. Galivan moved, seconded by Truman to approve the placement of a water line to the shelter building in Old Settlers Park from a curb stop on Terry Stuart's property to include a 1 inch water hydrant at the shelter and a one inch water hydrant on Stuart's property. The project will also include at least one curb stop in the new line as well as a water meter pit and a sunset agreement for Stuart to use water without charge as long as he owns the property. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Water utilities discussed: Brian Lawson, sales representative from Utility Equipment Company was present to give a presentation on the SET Smart Earth Technologies remote smart valve and abilities of the software. The Starter Solution complete package includes 5 Setflow X231 cellular AMI endpoints; SETflow meter data management system software; SETflow field mobile application and handheld tablet; lifetime data subscription for AT&T or Verizon; 2 hours of remote configuration and system training; 1 remote smart valve for a total cost of \$1800.00. The cost of an individual smart valve is \$369.00. The cost of a standard ultrasonic water meter is \$130.00.

Representatives from Omnitel, with an office in Truro, were present to discuss fiber optic internet within the city limits of New Virginia and right-of-way for placement. The fiber optic has been installed up to the west side of town at the intersection of Vermont Street and 38th Avenue. Omnitel's proposed work for 2021 is in areas of the west side of town (see attached map). Sign-ups are key to 2022 extension further into the city limits. **To sign up, citizens need to register at connect.omnitel.biz.** A \$50.00 deposit is required for a drop

to your home. Construction bonuses available only during construction include: free standard installation of any service; no contracts; save \$75.00 with a \$25.00 monthly internet credit for 3 months; free Omni-Fi premium Wi-Fi router for first 3 months. Prices for high speed internet, unlimited data are as follows: 50 Mbps \$89.95/mth; 100Mbps \$119.95/mth; 500 Mbps \$159.95/mth; Gigabit (1,000 Mbps) \$219.95/mth. Digital phone with unlimited local calling can be added for \$5.00/mth. Contractors installing the fiber optic lines are held to a one year warranty. OmniTel is willing to remove the old cable TV pedestals. If you have questions, contact the Truro Office at 641-765-4201 or email at questions@omnitel.biz. If interested, it is of utmost importance and essential that you sign up for the internet service at connect.omnitel.biz. The agreement regarding use of public right of way for fiber optic communications system will be forwarded to the City Attorney for review.

<u>Law Enforcement</u> – The report summary from the Sheriff's Office for the month of April was reviewed. Deputies received or initiated 15 calls for service during the month. Officers spent in excess of 47 hours in the City for the month. There was one citation and/or warning written for traffic violations that occurred within the City of New Virginia proper.

Proposed IT policies per ICAP, the City's insurance carrier were reviewed. Draft policies for acceptable internet use and passwords will continue to be worked on.

A public hearing was held to amend the current 2020-21 New Virginia City Budget. With no citizens present to approve or disapprove and no written or email responses regarding said proposed amendments, Nelson moved, seconded by Truman to close the public hearing. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

After reviewing amendments of the current budget, Nelson moved, seconded by Galivan to pass & approve the amendments to the current 2020-21 New Virginia City Budget (see attached Amendment Of Current Budget). A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Fire Department Business: Galivan moved, seconded by Truman to approve Alexis Owens from probationary status to full member status. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

The Council was advised the fire department received a grant from Farm Bureau in the amount of \$1500.00 for an enclosed trailer to store grain bin rescue equipment and other equipment. The cost of the trailer is \$2500.00. The additional \$1000.00 would be paid by the New Virginia Fire Department Association.

The City received a total of three bids for fire truck 768. The bids were opened and Galivan moved, seconded by Nelson to approve and accept the high bid of \$5376.00 for fire truck 768. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

The Council reviewed and discussed two street repair proposals. G&H Asphalt Corporation bid \$19900.00 – repave asphalt patches 2 and 4 inch depths; overlay Book Alley 2 inches deep. InRoads Asphalt Paving - \$20967.00 – repave all asphalt patches to depth of 4 inches; overlay Book Alley 2.5 inches deep. With all repave patches to be 4 inches deep and Book Alley to be 2.5 inches deep, Truman moved, seconded by Galivan to approve the InRoads Asphalt Paving bid of \$20967.00. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

GAMP FINANCIAL UPDATE May 3, 2021

The following are the balances for the GAMP accounts: Money Market \$31798.86; Regular Account \$765.58. Our rentals/groups utilizing the building still remains the same. We are still doing extra cleaning and sanitizing processes after each use. We are still strongly suggesting all who enter wear masks and social distance. We are also asking renters to operate at the 50% capacity. We will install a pop machine at the GAMP building as well. This will be placed outside to be used when residents are using the park. The disc golf course will be installed here in the near future.

NEW VIRGINIA PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE UPDATE

Steve Savage has removed the old shelter pad and the dead ash tree from the Lions Park. Mike Bethards has poured the new concrete slab for the shelter. Lane Sturtz and Dryseal Roofing will work on the construction of the second shelter within this month. Our deadline is June 1, 2021. We will need to move the current grills at the park in order to be compliant with the insurance regulations. We are working on placement of the two grills at the Lions Park and possibly two grills at the Gerry Allen Memorial Park. Mike Bethards was able pour the concrete for the new sign to be placed at the park. Once these projects are finished, we will place a memorial tree in honor of Mary Bates. Our account balance is \$11,916.82.

KEEP IOWA BEAUTIFUL PROGRAM

The account balance is \$9515.76. An Art In The Park activity is planned for June 13th that will include music and activities for kids. A five foot tall white oak tree is available for planting. It was discussed to place it in the Lions Park south of the basketball court.

Spring Curbside Clean-Up Day is scheduled for May 15th.

Congratulations from Mayor Huston to Ryan Meyer, a 7th grade student at Interstate 35 Community School who lives in Truro, for winning the state wide Iowa League Of Cities "If I Were Mayor" essay contest. Ryan received a \$500.00 scholarship for his winning essay.

Nelson moved, seconded by Galivan to approve payment of all City bills and GAMP bills. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried.

With no further business to come forth, Truman moved, seconded by Nelson to adjourn meeting. A roll call vote was taken: 3 ayes, 0 nays. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 11:00 p.m. The June council meeting is scheduled for Monday June 7th, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. **June meeting** date – Monday June 7th, 2021 at 7:00 p.m.

Annual Forages Can be a Valuable Resource

AMES, Iowa – Annual forages can provide flexibility when managing forage supply, whether filling forage production gaps or serving as a primary forage source.

Learn more about annual forages and integrating them into a cropping rotation in a virtual field day set for June 3 beginning at 8:30 a.m., hosted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

"We've seen an interest from producers wanting to integrate both cool and warm season annual forages into their farming operation," said Erika Lundy, beef specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "However, many questions still remain regarding which forage species is best for a given situation or farm goal as well as their nutritional value and yield potential."

The event will highlight a research project evaluating different cool-season annual forage species in terms of forage nutritional value, yield potential and practical considerations for integrating annual forages into cropping rotations. Critter Corner

Feline & Canine Parasites

From birth to adulthood, dog and cat owners should always be prudent with parasite control. Parasites are capable of causing serious illness and can easily be overlooked in our pets. In addition to this, parasites in our pets can even be transmissible to humans. Parasite control should start with our puppies and kittens and extend throughout the life of our pets. Controlling parasitism enables our pets to be as healthy as they can be, and it can prevent illness in the future. Strategically deworming cats and dogs can seem frustrating, but with the help of your veterinarian, it can be made simple.

The vast majority of pet owners know that each new kitten and puppy needs their exam and vaccines in order to prevent illness, especially at a young age. However, each new pet should have a fecal exam in order to establish the amount of parasites each pet has and how to treat them strategically. Every kitten and puppy are born with a certain amount of parasites because parasites are able to infect them in-utero with their mother. Depending on the parasite load, puppies and kittens can be given a dewormer to control the infection at a young age. This initial treatment helps clear the active infection and sets the pet up for success. Now, we should talk about how to control our pet's parasite load and the strategies we can use to make sure our pets are staying healthy.

An easy strategy to start employing to control parasites is to continue or start using monthly preventatives that prevent Heartworm Disease (Heartgard Plus, Interceptor Plus, Revolution Plus) because these products also deworm the pet monthly while at the same time preventing Heartworm. Pet owners that use preventatives are maintaining a healthy parasite load for their pets, and it's easy to start using preventatives for those that don't right now.

For those with cats that enjoy mousing or dogs that enjoy hunting, tapeworms can become an issue due to them eating other animals. Tapeworm treatment requires a specialized drug called Praziquantel and is not included in most monthly preventatives. Interceptor Plus for dogs and Centragard for cats are monthly preventatives that will treat and control tapeworms on a monthly basis. If tapeworms are diagnosed with a pet not on those preventatives, then treatment can be given with injectable or oral Praziquantel.

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
